

This report has been prepared to meet the Board of Architects of Queensland's (BOAQ) reporting obligations the under the Queensland Government's Regulator Performance Framework, which is a key element of the Better Regulation Strategy.

The five regulator model practices identified in the Better Regulation Strategy which support the achievement of the BOAQ's objectives and reduced burden/costs for all parties are:

- 1. Ensure regulatory activity is proportionate to risk and minimises unnecessary burden;
- 2. Consult and engage meaningfully with stakeholders;
- 3. Provide appropriate information and support to assist compliance;
- 4. Commit to continuous improvement; and
- 5. Be transparent and accountable in actions.

The below table 1 reports on the BOAQ's integration of these five model practices across its regulatory strategy and operations.
