CREATING JOBS FOR LOGAN

The Queensland Budget will directly support job creation in the Logan region with significant expenditure including:

Infrastructure

\$666M

for productivity-enhancing infrastructure and capital works, estimated to support around **2,200 jobs** in this region in 2020-21.

Health

\$2.7B

for the Metro South Hospital and Health Services.

Education

\$137.9M

to maintain, improve and upgrade schools in Logan.

The Logan region will also benefit from:

Social housing

\$77M

in 2020-21 to expand and improve social housing, including \$2.8 million Works for Tradies Initiative contributing to Queensland's economic recovery.

South West Pipeline

\$95.2M

to construct a pipeline to connect Beaudesert to the South East Queensland Water Grid to secure long-term water supply.

COVID Works for Queensland

\$8.3M

to support the delivery of job creating new infrastructure, maintenance or minor works as part of the Queensland Government's Economic Recovery Plan.

Delivering for the Logan region

Apprentice and Trainee Payroll Tax Rebate

\$9.6 million of rebates claimed by 424 businesses to reinvest into their business and support employment.
(July 2015 to October 2020)

Back to Work

\$8.1 million of payments have been paid to 415 employers to employ 718 eligible unemployed jobseekers.
(July 2017 to November 2020)

Made in Queensland

Eight agreements, worth \$5.1 million, entered to support local businesses to help grow regional economies, which is estimated to have supported 254 jobs.
(February 2017 to April 2019)

Skilling Queenslanders for Work

\$48.3 million allocated to provide training to 6,084 people, including 3,753 people who have now been employed.
(July 2015 to October 2020)

Logan

1 Underwood Sports Park

✓ \$311,000 in 2020-21 out of a \$10 million total spend to redevelop Underwood Sports Park to include multipurpose community facilities.

2 Pacific Motorway (M1) (Eight Mile Plains to Daisy Hill)

✓ \$94.3 million in 2020-21 out of a \$750 million total spend to upgrade the Pacific Motorway between Eight Mile Plains and Daisy Hill to extend the busway and reduce congestion and travel times. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

3 Springwood Road State School

✓ \$150,000 over four years to upgrade the oval.

4 Springwood State High School

✓ \$2.7 million in 2020-21 out of a \$10 million total spend for refurbishment of the multi-purpose performing arts hall and multiple learning spaces, a new canteen and a network upgrade.

5 Daisy Hill Action Plan - visitor facilities upgrade

✓ \$2.5 million in 2020-21 to upgrade infrastructure including walking tracks, bike trails, car park and visitor access at the Daisy Hill Conservation Park.

6 Logan PCYC development

✓ \$3 million in 2020-21 out of a \$6.6 million total spend to construct a new PCYC on the Cronulla Park site, located at the intersection of Kingston Road and Compton Road, Slacks Creek.

9 Pacific Motorway (M1) (Daisy Hill to Logan Motorway)

✓ \$3.9 million in 2020-21 out of a \$1 billion total spend to upgrade the next section of the M1 between Daisy Hill and the Logan Motorway. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

15 Logan Hospital

✓ \$53.6 million in 2020-21 out of a \$603.6 million total spend to deliver an additional 206 beds and treatment spaces with a vertical expansion of Building 3 and targeted refurbishment of other key locations. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

16 Browns Plains Little Athletics

✓ \$13,439 in 2020-21 for new athletics equipment for Browns Plains Little Athletics.

17 Waterford Rugby League Club

✓ \$339,027 in 2020-21 out of a \$500,000 total spend for Waterford Rugby League Football Club Inc. to construct a clubhouse to support rugby league at Meadowbrook.

18 Carbrook State School

✓ \$500,000 to expand the administration building.

19 Loganlea replacement permanent fire and rescue station

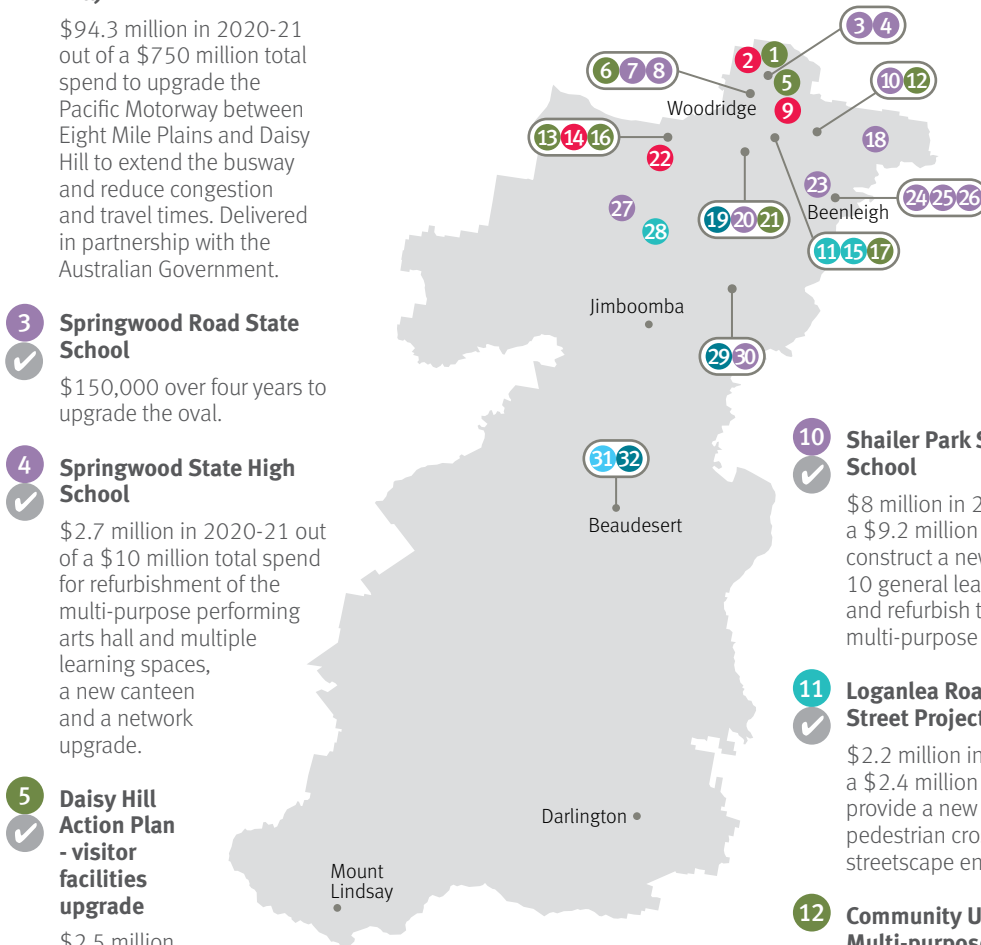
✓ \$150,000 in 2020-21 out of a \$4 million total spend to continue replacement of the permanent fire and rescue station at Loganlea.

20 Marsden State High School

✓ \$13.6 million in 2020-21 out of a \$17.5 million total spend to construct a new building with six general learning spaces and 11 specialist learning spaces.

21 New Sport Field Lighting

✓ \$95,740 in 2020-21 out of a \$282,397 total spend for Marsden State High School to supply and install field lighting to support football and rugby league at Marsden State High School, Waterford West.



10 Shailer Park State High School

✓ \$8 million in 2020-21 out of a \$9.2 million total spend to construct a new building with 10 general learning spaces and refurbish the existing multi-purpose shelter.

11 Loganlea Road Healthy Street Project

✓ \$2.2 million in 2020-21 out of a \$2.4 million total spend to provide a new shared pathway, pedestrian crossing and streetscape enhancements.

12 Community Use Indoor Multi-purpose Court

✓ \$718,071 in 2020-21 out of a \$1.5 million total spend to refurbish and upgrade the multi-purpose hall with a wooden sprung-floor basketball court at Shailer Park State High School.

13 Community Use Sports Facilities

✓ \$473,929 in 2020-21 out of a \$500,000 total spend to construct field lighting, change sheds and a small canteen at Browns Plains State School.

14 Greenbank bus facility park 'n' ride upgrade

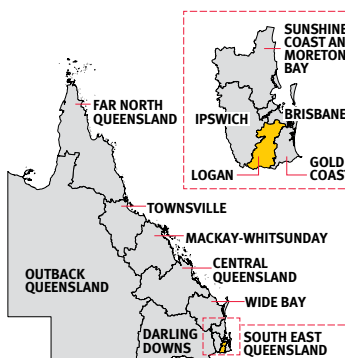
✓ \$9.2 million in 2020-21 out of a \$21 million total spend to upgrade Greenbank bus facility park 'n' ride.

7 Mabel Park State High School

✓ \$20.2 million over three years to construct a new building with additional classrooms and an automotive training facility.

8 Logan City Special School

✓ \$6.6 million in 2020-21 out of a \$10.5 million total spend to construct a new building with additional classrooms.



22 Mount Lindesay Highway (Brisbane to Beaudesert), Johanna Street to South Street (Jimboomba)

\$2 million in 2020-21 out of a \$53 million total spend to duplicate lanes on Mount Lindesay Highway between Johanna Street and South Street in Jimboomba. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

23 Hydrogen Training Centre of Excellence

\$18 million in 2020-21 out of a \$20 million total spend for phase 2 development of the Queensland Apprenticeship Centre to incorporate a Hydrogen Training Centre of Excellence.

24 Beenleigh State High School

\$12 million over four years to construct a new multi-purpose hall.

25 Mt Warren Park State School

\$1 million over three years to refurbish the roofs of seven buildings.

26 Windaroo State School

\$700,000 over four years to construct two new outdoor creative learning spaces that can cater for 16 classes.

27 New primary school in North Maclean


\$26.9 million in 2020-21 out of a \$66.5 million total spend to construct a new primary school in North Maclean.

28 Munruben Ambulance Station

\$1.3 million in 2020-21 out of a \$3.6 million total spend for the construction of a new Ambulance Station at Munruben.

29 Yarrabilba new permanent fire and rescue station

\$2.7 million in 2020-21 out of a \$4.5 million total spend to continue the new permanent fire and rescue station at Yarrabilba.

30 Community TAFE Learning Centre pilot at Yarrabilba

\$1.5 million for a Community TAFE Learning Centre pilot in Yarrabilba.

31 Beaudesert Business Park Expansion

\$1 million in 2020-21 out of a \$5 million total spend to expand the Beaudesert Business Park to enable it to continue to attract light and medium industry.

32 Beaudesert replacement police facility

\$4 million in 2020-21 out of a \$7.1 million total spend to continue the replacement of the police facility at Beaudesert.

33 Primary School in Bahrs Scrub

\$1 million over four years to plan for a new primary school for Bahrs Scrub.

34 Cultural engagement in Gondwana Rainforests

\$275,000 to enhance awareness of First Nations culture in the Gondwana Rainforests in partnership with the Traditional Owners.

Community Infrastructure Investment Partnership

The \$15 million Community Infrastructure Investment Partnership (CIIP) program will deliver additional and improved community infrastructure to support critical social service delivery in communities impacted by COVID-19. Grant funding will enable a mix of refurbishments, new builds, feasibility and design works to improve vital community infrastructure.

A flagship initiative, the Access Economic Hub, is the first pilot project to be supported under the program. The Access Economic Hub, in the heart of Logan, will provide a full range of employment readiness, job training, social enterprise and business incubator services and link participants to social services. The project will support up to 22 construction jobs in Logan. Other CIIP-funded initiatives will support an additional 26 construction jobs and assist many community service organisations across the State.



Logan City Council – Digital Infrastructure and Connectivity Program

The Queensland Government is providing \$2.5 million to support initial feasibility works as part of Logan City Council's Digital Infrastructure and Connectivity Program, which seeks to identify the city's current and future digital infrastructure requirements. The program identifies opportunities to build or extend digital networks in priority greenfield, residential and industrial development areas such as Greater Flagstone and Yarrabilba.

A strong internet connection is vital for business and job creation in South East Queensland. This investment paves the way for the Logan City Council to engage with private sector telecommunications providers to improve the quality and coverage of digital infrastructure, and lay the foundation for a new wave of economic development in the region.

Tax Relief Package

The Government provided significant tax relief to support Queensland businesses, landlords, tenants, pubs and clubs, including:

- Payroll tax refunds, waivers and deferrals for eligible businesses, targeted at small to medium businesses
- A payroll tax exemption for wages subsidised by the JobKeeper payment
- Land tax rebates, waivers and deferrals for eligible taxpayers.

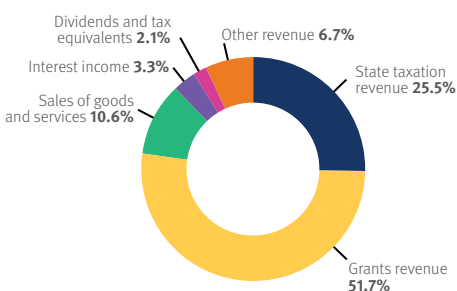
An estimated 360 businesses in Logan will also benefit in 2020-21 from the higher payroll tax threshold.

STATEWIDE HIGHLIGHTS

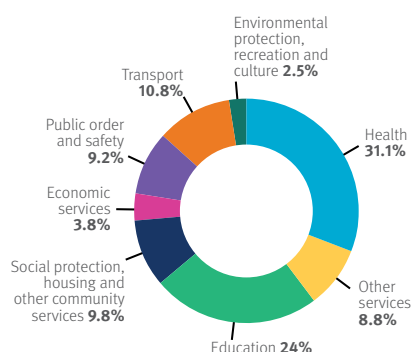
This Budget is focused on creating jobs and getting our economy moving sooner. Initiatives include:

- Driving the largest infrastructure program in over a decade - \$14.8 billion in 2020–21, directly supporting 46,000 jobs. Around 58% of the capital program and 28,700 of the jobs supported will be outside the Greater Brisbane area.
- Growing our regions and supporting key industries such as tourism, agriculture and mining. An additional \$200 million will be provided to the Works for Queensland program to support local governments outside South East Queensland.
- Enhancing frontline services. The Budget will support funding for additional frontline health staff including 5,800 nurses, 1,500 doctors and 1,700 allied health professionals through to 2024.
- Providing more Queenslanders with access to the skills and training they need for rewarding careers. \$100 million has been provided over three years to upgrade TAFE campuses.
- Backing small businesses to support jobs and communities. More than \$7 billion in COVID-19 stimulus measures have been provided so far, including reducing business costs through payroll tax relief and other tax relief measures, and accelerating projects to unlock development and increase economic activity.
- Providing concessions and easing the cost of living, with an estimated \$6.3 billion in 2020–21 in targeted discounts, fee waivers, rebates, and subsidies.
- Increasing investment in manufacturing including \$1 billion to make trains again in Queensland.
- Protecting the environment. The Great Barrier Reef will benefit from an additional \$40 million worth of support. This includes \$10 million for a Reef Assist Program and \$6 million over four years for the GBR Island Arks project to deliver ecotourism in the region.
- Delivering lower debt than New South Wales and Victoria.
