LAVO partnership fuels Queensland's hydrogen industry

Greater Springfield will be home to Australia's first hydrogen fuel cell manufacturing facility, further boosting Queensland's growing hydrogen industry and creating hundreds of new local jobs.

The Queensland Government is partnering with LAVO Hydrogen Technology Ltd to establish the \$15 million facility, which is supported by the government's Invested in Queensland program as part of its \$3.34 billion Queensland Jobs Fund. The project will support up to 200 local jobs during the construction phase and will generate almost 170 long-term operational jobs when production at the new facility ramps up.

Queensland is a global energy powerhouse with its abundance of sunshine, clean water and open skies, attracting investment opportunities that will firmly establish our state's reputation as Australia's home for hydrogen production. By partnering with private companies like LAVO, the Queensland Government expects to create up to 5,000 new jobs over the life of its Invested in Queensland program.

New primary school for Ripley Valley

A new state primary school for Ripley Valley is currently being built for the increasing school-aged population in one of the fastest-growing areas of South East Queensland.

The Queensland Government has invested close to \$60 million to construct the new primary school in Ripley, which will open its doors in 2023. It is the second primary school in the Ripley Valley Priority Development Area, which is set to be home to 120,000 people once fully developed over the next 4 decades.

At full capacity, the school will accommodate up to 1,200 students from Prep to Year 6 and employ up to 100 full-time teaching and support staff. For its first year, the school will open for all year levels from Prep to Year 6.

The Queensland Government is investing \$311.6 million in new and improved education infrastructure in the Ipswich region during 2022–23.
